You are about to purchase a product that is not simple and may be difficult to understand.

1. What is this product?

Type

An Over the Counter (OTC) derivative contract – Purchase of a Payer Swaption

Objectives

Swaptions are used for managing interest rate risks.

A Payer Swaption is an agreement between two contracting parties (client/UniCredit Bank AG), where you, as the buyer of the Payer Swaption have the right to either enter into an interest rate swap (payer) at agreed product terms (= swap settlement) or receive any positive market value of the underlying interest rate swap (payer) (= cash settlement). The type of the option settlement and the exercise date are contractually agreed.

When purchasing the Payer Swaption you pay an option premium upfront, which is not refundable. The amount of the option premium depends among other things on the term of the swaption, the volatility of the interest rate market and the terms of the underlying interest rate swap (payer).

An interest rate swap is an agreement between two contracting parties (client/UniCredit Bank AG) to exchange interest payments, calculated on a notional amount during the contractually agreed term. The interest payments are exchanged at certain agreed dates. Terms of up to ten years are customary. The term of this agreement is divided into individual interest periods, which are determined by the period applicable to the reference rate.

In an interest rate swap (payer) you pay a fixed interest rate and receive a floating interest rate (reference rate, if applicable plus a spread) in the same currency. The fixed interest rate is determined when the contracting parties enter into the swap. The reference rate (e.g. EURIBOR) is reset two banking days before the start of a respective interest period. Any reference rate with applicable periods (e.g. 3 month EURIBOR) can be selected as base for the floating interest payments. In general the parties agree to offset the two interest payments, so that only the amount in excess at the end of each interest period is actually paid. If the floating interest rate and/or the fixed interest rate is negative, the direction of the respective interest payment changes.

The notional amount serves merely to calculate the respective interest payment. There is no amount payable/receivable equal to the notional amount.

You can enter into this product also in a foreign currency.

Sample product terms are set out below and are based on legally predefined or realistic assumptions and may not match your specific contract details.

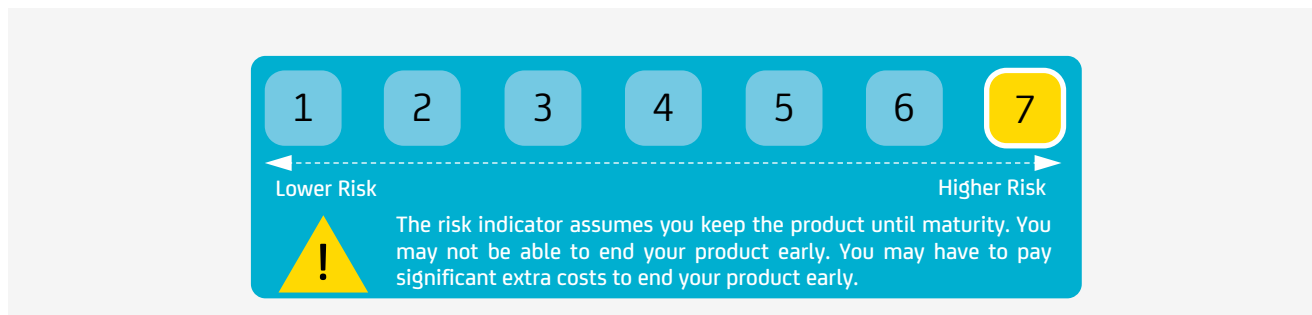

2. What are the risks and what could I get in return?

Risk Indicator

The summary risk indicator is a guide to the level of risk of this product compared to other products. It shows how likely it is that the product will lose money because of movements in the markets or because we are not able to pay you.

We have classified this product as 7 out of 7, which is the highest risk class.



Be aware of currency risk. You may pay and/or receive payments in a different currency, so the final return you will get depends on the exchange rate between the two currencies. This risk is not considered in the indicator shown above.

In some circumstances you may be required to make payments to pay for losses. The total loss you may incur may be significant.

3. What happens if UniCredit Bank AG is unable to pay out?

Counterparties of derivative transactions are exposed to the risk that UniCredit Bank AG becomes unable to discharge its obligations under the transaction, for example in the case of an insolvency (inability to pay or overindebtedness) or in the case resolution measures are taken by an authority against the credit institution. Such a decision to take resolution measures can, for example, be taken if the assets of the institution are less than its liabilities, where it is unable or will, in the near future, be unable to pay its debts or other liabilities as they fall due, or where it requires extraordinary public financial support. Where resolution measures are taken, the competent resolution authority can decide on an early termination of the derivative transaction. In the case such early termination results in a claim of the counterparty against the credit institution, the decision of the resolution authority can lead to a partial or complete reduction of the principal amount of this claim or in a conversion of this claim in to equity (shares or other types of equity).

If UniCredit Bank AG does not fulfil its obligations connected with the product or is unable to pay, you can lose part of or the full payout or can suffer an unlimited loss. This product is not protected by any deposit guarantee scheme, legal or otherwise, or any other type of guarantee.

4. What are the costs?

The Reduction in Yield (RIY) shows what impact the total costs you pay will have on the performance of the product. The total costs take into account one-off, ongoing and incidental costs.

The amounts shown here are the cumulative costs of the product itself for the recommended holding period. The figures assume a notional amount of EUR 10,000. The figures are estimates and may change in the future.

5. How long should I hold it and can I take money out early?

Recommended holding period: 10 Years

The recommended holding period is equal to the contractually agreed term. You are not entitled to terminate the product unilaterally before the end of the contractually agreed term.

This does not apply in case you have contractually agreed with UniCredit Bank AG that one party or both parties have the right to prematurely terminate this product upon notice to the other party and subject to a compensation payment (contractual early termination clause).
